
About Enfield... Incorporated: 1761

Origin: First named Enfield by settlers from Enfield, Connecticut, the town was renamed "Relhan" in 1766 to honor Dr. Anthony Relhan. The doctor was a promoter of sea bathing as a curative, instrumental to making Brighton a fashionable English resort. The town was renamed Enfield in 1784 after the American Revolution.

Enfield was the site of a Shaker Community established in the late 1700's, whose buildings now make up our "Shaker Village" site, being formerly occupied by the La Salette Brotherhood of Montreal. The Shrine of Our Lady of La Salette is well known for its Christmas holiday display.

Enfield is home to Mascoma Lake and Crystal Lake and includes the villages of Upper and Lower Shaker Village, Enfield Center and Lockehaven.

Dedicated to Sylvia & David Dow

The Board of Selectmen dedicate the 2021 Annual Report to Sylvia and David Dow for their contributions to Enfield, the Upper Valley, and the special needs community at large.

Sylvia and David are the parents of two daughters both of whom have developmental disabilities. After identifying a need for a place where aging parents could transition the care of adult children with developmental and other disabilities to live independently with the support they need, they worked to incorporate Visions for Creative Housing Solutions as a nonprofit organization. The Sunrise Farm off of Kluge Road in Enfield, on the grounds of the former



Kluge Inn, was transferred to Visions and provides housing and support for eleven individuals with developmental and other disabilities. Programming and supportive care helps to maximize resident independence and keeps them actively involved in our community.

Prior to Visions, Sylvia founded the Art Lab program at AVA Gallery to provide a creative outlet for developmentally disabled adults.

Sylvia and David created Visions for Creative Housing Solutions to "provide residential options, services and support designed to meet the needs of adults with developmental disabilities and similar disabling conditions." They are "dedicated to fostering growth and independence through vocational, social, and recreational opportunities."

The success of Visions led the NH Housing Finance Authority to grant Visions \$50,000 to create a "Supported Housing Toolkit" to inspire replication of similar facilities through the State. In 2017 Visions began to explore community need and solicit input resulting in Green Street Commons in Lebanon. This Lebanon Visions location opened in the Fall of 2021 and houses eleven adults with developmental disabilities. Work is underway currently to transform the former Outreach House in Hanover to become a third location to house twelve individuals, all thanks to the Vision model begun by the Dows right here in Enfield.



Remembering....

In 2021, the Town of Enfield has sadly lost wonderful individuals who have contributed through community volunteerism and involvement. Our hearts go out to their families.





Carl Patten was a very active member of the Enfield Community. The owner of Carl Patten Construction from 1961 until 1998, you would think this would keep him busy enough, but Mr. Patten always had time to volunteer within the community. He served as Highway Agent for two years from 1972 until 1974, and as Selectman for eleven years from 1976 until 1987. In his role as Selectmen, he also served as Water/Sewer Commissioner.

In May 1993, Carl was appointed as a member of the Bridge Study Committee, which was charged with investigating the feasibility of a new bridge at the Wescott/McConnell Road or the Baltic/Pillsbury Street sites. The March 1994 Town Meeting approved funding for the bridge at Pillsbury Street and Baltic Streets. The Bridge Study Committee was renamed the Pillsbury St. Bridge Committee on March 21, 1994; Carl Patten continued to serve. In July 1996 the new bridge crossing at Baltic and Pillsbury Streets was opened and dedicated to Carl Patten. A monument stands at the southeast corner of the bridge identifying the new bridge as Patten's River Crossing, a tribute to Mr. Patten's hard work and dedication to this project and the Town of Enfield.

Carl Patten also served for four years, from May 18, 2000 until March 15, 2004, on the Building Committee for the Enfield Public Works building. This Committee provided an in-depth look at the needs of the Public Works Department and the Town of Enfield. A comprehensive report was provided and by a vote of Town Meeting we now have the Public Works building located at 74 Lockehaven Road.

Not only did Mr. Patten help the municipal government, but he also assisted the Mascoma School District's Building Needs Committee, including a review of the Enfield Elementary School drainage issues. Carl Patten Construction also removed a large oil tank from the Elementary School driveway.

William Considine June 21, 1941 – March 26,2021



William "Bill" Considine served on the Enfield Recreation Commission 2017 – 2019, bringing with him a wealth of education and knowledge in physical education and health education, exercise science and sports studies, and sport management and recreation and more.

Robert R. Bachand February 12, 1932 – April 24, 2021



A dedicated Enfield-Mascoma Lions Club member for 25 years, Robert "Bob" Bachand has contributed so much to our community. He received many awards for outstanding service: the Melvin Jones Fellowship, the Granite State Fellowship, and Enfield Lion of the Year. He was also presented with a Lifetime Membership from the Enfield Lions. He was proud to have helped build the Enfield Community Building, which the Lions Club donated to the town. Once a month, Bob, his wife Effie, and their loyal group of volunteers would serve home-cooked meals to local senior citizens at the Enfield Community Building.

In 2020, for demonstrating service on behalf of older citizens, Bob and Effie received the first annual "Older Adult Volunteer Award" from the NH State Commission on Aging.

Our appreciation of Bob's service to the community is beyond measure.

Verna Dunn December 13, 1919 – May 18, 2021 Holder of the Boston Post Cane May 1, 2019 – May 18, 2021



We were all saddened to hear last May of the passing of Verna Dunn at the age of 101. Verna was our oldest resident and the proud holder of the Boston Post Cane from May 1, 2019 until her passing in 2021. On Sunday afternoons during the summer, the Enfield Historical Society opens its Lockehaven school house to visitors. As she neared 100 years of age, Verna Dunn asked to host one of the events, perhaps because she had attended school there as a young girl. It was the best attended Society event of the season, as her family and relatives gathered to be with her. Verna sat in the old oak teacher's chair behind the matching desk and reminisced about life in one room schools, the teachers, and studies undertaken. In her reserved way she kept the audience spell-bound for more than two hours with first-hand recollections from school past: her life in Enfield and opinions on current events. The in-person account itself was an opportunity, but to cover a period of 100 years is unusual and something for which the Society is grateful. Verna Dunn continued to work at the Methodist Church thrift shop up until just a few weeks before her passing – continuing to give to the community. She was a strong woman with a wealth of knowledge that she willingly shared. She will be sorely missed by all who knew her.

Report of the Board of Selectmen

It has been a year of challenge and change for Enfield. With the Covid 19 pandemic raging, half the year was spent with meetings held in Zoom format under the Governor's emergency orders and with a mask mandate in place, which was later lifted to a mask recommendation. Throughout the year, the Town was kept on track through the skilled leadership of Interim Town Manager, Jack Wozmak and Assistant Town Manager, Alisa Bonnette.

Town Moderator Lindsay Smith adapted to the pandemic by reconfiguring Town Meeting, moving voting to the Community Building, and in May, holding the deliberative session under a tent in Huse Park.

The search for a new Town Manager began in earnest with the formation of a citizens' review committee to work with search firm Municipal Resources Inc. Then in March, interviews with prospective candidates were held with the Board of Selectmen. With no suitable candidate found, the search was paused for a time, to be reconvened in September. Following the renewed search, a new Town Manager was hired in early December. The Town looks forward to welcoming Ed Morris as their new Town Manager in January. Jack Wozmak will stay on for a brief period to assist with the transition.

Fire Chief Fred Cummings resigned in April to move on to new challenges. For the next two months, the day-to-day operations of the Fire Department were ably handled by Jeremy Ford & John Pellerin. Phil Neily retired as Building Inspector in January, only to be appointed in June as Enfield's new Fire Chief. Longtime Town Clerk Sandy Romano retired in December and her able Deputy, Wendy Huntley, took over as Town Clerk.

Water and sewer issues continue to plague the Town. DPW Director Jim Taylor invited James Rivers, Project Engineer for DPC Engineering to present recommendations for a potential site for a wastewater treatment plant, should Enfield pursue having our own wastewater treatment plant. After reviewing possible sites, Mr. Rivers determined the current practices were the ideal infrastructure for the Town of Enfield. At Town Meeting in May, two bond issues addressing water and sewer were passed which will improve Enfield's aging water and sewer systems.

In September, the Town received funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) in the amount of \$474,349.00. The Selectboard recommended that a portion of this money be put towards the municipal bonds for water and sewer and the remainder go toward general town-wide projects which will directly benefit all members of the community.

A Master Planning Task Force was formed to assist in updating the Master Plan. Meetings have been held throughout the year in addition to community information sessions. The Master Planning Task Force also sent out a survey to all residents, the results of which are currently being compiled.

The pavilion at Mascoma Lakeside Park was completed in time for Old Home Days in July. The first official public event held in the pavilion was a concert by Cardigan Mountain Traditions. Later in the fall, a new ADA compliant access to the park from the Rail Trail was constructed. Several workdays were held to remove invasive species and replant native varieties. Over 1,000 daffodil bulbs were planted in the fall for spring blooms. The park received a Land and Water Conservation Grant (\$125,000) in late September for parking lot improvements and other park amenities. The Mascoma Lakeside Park Committee is in the process of raising the necessary match for this grant.

A plan to expand Whitney Hall and a plan to build a safety complex will be discussed at public meetings in January 2022. The plans and recommendations represent long hours of meetings held by the Municipal Facilities Advisory Committee (MFAC), which was dissolved in March 2021, having fulfilled its

obligations to the Town. It is hoped that a decision can be made at Town Meeting of 2022 on whether to move forward with either or both of these projects. Members of MFAC remain available to advise on these proposals. We extend our gratitude for all the time they have dedicated to these plans.

Also of interest is the Depot Street building, another Town owned building studied by MFAC. Currently, it is used to house the Town rescue vehicle. The historic building was once the railroad passenger terminal for Enfield. However, the land under the building is owned by NH Department of Transportation, Division of Rails and Transit. The state is currently assessing if it is surplus land that can be sold. If the property becomes available for purchase, it would be brought forward to the Selectboard for evaluation.

The Selectboard is committed to working diligently on all issues affecting the citizens of Enfield. We welcome comments and suggestions from the people of Enfield. Working together, we will keep Enfield the best town in the Upper Valley!

Report of the Budget Committee

The 2021 Enfield Budget Committee season has concluded with a proposed budget that continues the Committee's longstanding commitment to supporting essential services and minimizing impacts on residents. The committee and town staff did excellent work in continuing to adapt to the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic. During 2021, the Budget Committee transitioned back to inperson meetings but continued the use of Zoom to ensure as much access to the public as possible. The Committee continued its practice of meeting throughout the year and increasing meeting frequency during the budget season. These meetings included evaluations of budget and revenue reports, as well as presentations from our department's leaders sharing their summaries and proposed budgets.

The Committee's comprehensive preparation of the budget started with a discussion of expectations and concerns with the Town Manager. The Town Manager then presented an initial proposed budget to the Committee for feedback and comments. The town department heads presented the Committee with adjusted proposed budgets that incorporated the initial feedback. The Committee had extensive discussions around areas where the 2022 proposed budget differs from the 2021 budget. This includes labor rates for several DPW and Administrative positions, cost of living increases, expanding the roles of two positions, and the inclusion of one new position focused on facility maintenance. Finally, the committee reviewed the entire town budget again. Adjustments to the proposed budget were made throughout the process.

Highlights of 2021

Non-property tax revenue (NPTR) is a significant component in creating the proposed budget. While NPTR was strong in 2021, the projections for certain revenue streams, such as rooms and meals taxes, remain uncertain going into 2022. For this reason, the Town Manager and Budget Committee are continuing to apply conservative estimates to non-property tax revenue projections for 2021.

The Budget Committee continues to review and keep a close eye on the undesignated fund balance, which has reversed course from a deficit prior to 2017. Over the past several years the town has seen budget surpluses, rebuilding the towns undesignated fund balance and regaining a more solid footing for the town's finances. This year's unaudited budget surplus is estimated at \$561,661. Approximately 60% of this surplus was a result of vacant staff positions. An additional ~16% is a result of other labor costs including adaptations in services as a result of the pandemic. If this surplus is confirmed by the auditor, the town's undesignated fund balance will reach the town's policy target. It is recommended that the undesignated fund balance be maintained at 8%-17% of the general ledger budget (which includes payments to county government and the local school district). In 2019 the Enfield Selectboard adopted a town policy target of 12%.

Looking Ahead to 2022

The Committee's work in 2022 will include continued considerations of the competitive labor market and general inflation being higher than prior years. The Committee will continue to review the undesignated fund balance and discuss strategies for tapering its growth as it approaches the town policy target. The Budget Committee looks forward to continuing its collaborations with the town's departments and committees this year to meet the needs of our town.

Recommended Operating Budget

The Enfield Budget Committee recommends an operating budget of \$7.57 million. The Committee's recommended budget continues to maintain the town's essential services while tending to our ongoing

capital needs and supporting our overall infrastructure. This budget represents a projected rate of \$7.96 if there is no change to the town's property valuation.

I would like to thank our Committee members who put forth a remarkable effort to develop and recommend a responsible budget that supports our town's high quality of life and core services while also working to minimize tax impact. I'm also grateful for our Board of Selectmen and our dedicated town staff for their participation and efforts during our budget process.


